Isn't it a bit weird that Catholics call the Pope "papa," father? This Sunday provides us with essential Scriptural background on the papacy, the petrine office. Jesus gives Peter the "keys to the kingdom of heaven," after witnessing to the special grace Peter has to know Jesus' true

identity. Many have pointed out that the "keys" refer back to the figure of Eliakim, King David's prime minister. True enough. But notice this is not mere authority or power. It's a family relationship. The Lord says to Eliakim, "He shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem" (Isaiah 22:21). David's prime minister was a spiritual father to the family of Israel. Peter, and his successors, will be spiritual fathers in the family of the Church.

This means we have a serious obligation to not only recognize the Pope's authority, but also to love him with the affection of children for their papa. We should never speak about him with disrespect or rancor. We should listen to him with trusting hearts, and ignore the slander thrown at him in various media. When we show the world we are loving and obedient to our Holy Papa, perhaps they'll see more clearly that the Church is indeed God's beloved family.— Fr. John Muir

#### Table Ministry

The Bible gives us many instances of Jesus eating with others. His first miracle was the wedding feast at Cana where he kept the feast going by replenishing the wine supply. He ate

at several people's houses, including Matthew, three different Pharisees, Martha and Mary, and Simon the Leper. He also had two different times where he fed a multitude of people, four thousand in the wilderness and five thousand in a deserted place.

These times are often called **Jesus' table ministry**. In the culture of his day, sharing a meal with someone was a very intimate experience. That was why they were shocked and



amazed when he ate with sinners, but we can see from the list that he ate with pretty much everyone, old friends, new friends, scholars and sinners.

Jesus' table ministry was a way of preparing his followers to understand how they were to carry out table ministry after his return to the Father. At the last supper he instituted the Eucharist, when he took bread, blessed broke it and gave it to his disciples. He took the chalice and again blessed it and give it to his disciples. At the last Supper, Jesus told them to do this in memory of him.

In Hebrew, *memory* is not just recalling something from the past, it is actually making present today something that happened in the past. God is not limited by time and space, so we have to consider that what is happening at Mass is connected to all of the other Eucharistic sacrifices all over the world and through all the ages. We connect to all of those other Masses and to the first offering in the upper room. At Mass, we re-present the offering that Jesus presented, and we celebrate the true presence of Jesus Christ in particular time and place.

It is a table ministry that Jesus shares with us today. Just like in all of his dinners in the Bible, he shares it with everyone. King and peasant, rich and poor, saint and sinner - Jesus comes to us all to give us a share in his divine life.





## WHERE DOES IT SAY THAT?



#### THIS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT...

#### THREATENS PARENTAL RIGHTS

By using "individual" instead of adult or woman, anyone under the age of 18 could have an abortion or make any other reproductive decision without their parents' consent or notification.

#### **PUTS WOMEN AT RISK**

Current Ohio laws\* require abortion providers to explain procedure risks and ensure access to hospital transfer if needed. These health and safety standards could be seen as a "burden" and be eliminated, making it even less safe for women seeking an abortion.

## ALLOWS ABORTIONS THROUGH 9 MONTHS OF PREGNANCY

In U.S. law,\*\* "health" includes age or physical, emotional, or psychological well-being. This means a woman's age or emotional health could be cited to justify aborting a full-term baby. An abortionproviding physician would decide when a baby could survive outside the womb, leaving no clear protections for preborn children.

#### IS MISLEADING

Referring to "miscarriage care" promotes a myth that a "right to abortion" is necessary to preserve care for miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. This is false. Catholic hospitals have always provided comprehensive miscarriage care and will continue to do so regardless of the outcome of this vote.

#### **ARTICLE I, SECTION 22**

The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety

- Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on contraception, fertility treatment, continuing one's own pregnancy, miscarriage care, and abortion.
- 2. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either an individual's voluntary exercise of this right or a person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
- However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.
- 4. As used in this Section, 'Fetal viability' means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis"; and 'State" includes any governmental entity and political subdivision.
- 5. This Section is self-executing.
