

33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was a kid, I hated playing Monopoly because my siblings and friends always seemed to win. But worse was how it happened. Scared to risk my fake money on

buying properties, I'd hold on to it. My opponents hungrily bought up the various real estate squares on the board. Then, inevitably, my poor, low-equity self would land on their spots, pay them rent, and my money would drain to zero. It seemed so unfair. The rich get richer, and the poor get poorer. I had to learn that monopoly money is meant to be spent. I was scared to lose some of it. So. I lost all of it.

How do we see what we possess? Jesus' parable about the talents is not really about economics but about the investability of everything he entrusts to us. How marvelous that everyone in the fable who places talents in the open market doubles their investment. The only one who doesn't is the man who fearfully buries his one talent. Jesus' success strategy for us seems to be, whatever we have, get it out of our possession. Risk it as quickly and as fully as we can.

You and I have precious gifts. We have valuable things to invest — time, talents, treasure. The Lord invites us to be brave and even somewhat reckless, to give as much away as possible. If we give it away in the direction of love and truth, it will grow. If we hold on to it in fear, the little we have will be taken away. Let me challenge you this week: find something in your life you're holding on to, and risk it by giving it away. It won't double if you hold on to it.— Father John Muir

Give Thanks at All Times

Our faith continually challenges us, urging us to find gratitude even in difficult times. While it may be easy to praise God during moments of prosperity, true faith calls us to give thanks in all circumstances.

Certainly, praising God feels natural when life is good. Days when the sun shines, your family thrives, your job brings satisfaction, and good health allows you to relish your favorite activities—all seem perfect reasons to express gratitude.


Yet, true faith is tested when faced with adversity. In moments of sorrow, the inclination to question God's plan arises. The "Why me?" sentiment emerges, and blame may be directed toward God or even to yourself. It's a natural, human response to feel downtrodden during tough times.

St. Peter's life reflects this human struggle. Initially resistant to the idea of the Cross, he rebukes Jesus, prompting a stern response. Even during Jesus' trial, Peter denies any association with him to avoid sharing in Jesus' fate. However, Peter eventually understands and is able to accept the inevitable cross.


We learn from Jesus that the path to the glory of resurrection involves enduring suffering, hardship, and pain. Embracing the

contact Beth. We do have some extra cards that I can give you. I can drop cards off to our homebound and pick them up. Cards need to be completed by December 14.




