Second Sunday of Lent: When Sacrifice Becomes Mundane It seems to happen every year, like clockwork: we drag a bit, as we enter into the second week of Lent. On Ash Wednesday, we feel a bit like soldiers banging our shields, rushing into battle. "We're ready, God!" our hearts cry out.



"Transform us through sacrifice! Your will be done!"

But by now, these Lenten resolutions are no longer novelties — they've joined the ranks of everyday inconveniences, which somehow are the hardest to bear. Because transformation, in real life, happens in inches, just as a battle is won slowly in the crash of one sword against another. It's not always a dramatic thing, to the naked eye. It's the perseverance in prayer despite weariness, or the continual denial of some pleasure even though there's that nagging voice in our minds saying: go ahead, God doesn't really mind.

It's a week when we all need a shock to the system — and wouldn't you know it, this Sunday God gives us a double-whammy of dramatic sacrificial scenes. We picture Abraham, who also cried "Ready!" when God called, never imagining what He would ask: the surrender of his long-awaited son. We see Christ himself transfigured, as God shows us what He is ready to give up for love of us.

We must remain committed, persevering daily in acknowledging that everything belongs to God. What we sacrifice, we simply give back to Him.

If God is for us, who can be against us? Can we still reply, "Ready!" when we hear the call of God?— Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS





What if I fall asleep when I pray?

When Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane. praying during his agony, his disciples were there with him, but they fell asleep. He has asked them to pray with him, but they could not stay awake. This would lead us to believe that we need to stay awake and prav.

There are, however, other times when it appears that sleeping is okay. Remember the time when Jesus and his disciples got into a boat. Jesus, exhausted from a days preaching, teaching and healing, fell asleep on a cushion. When the disciples become afraid when a storm kicks up, they wake him. Jesus took naps, so maybe its okay to sleep.



What does the Pope have to say? Pope Francis has been caught napping from time to time. When he visited the US, he fell asleep during the first Mass. He has also admitted that he falls asleep during other times of prayer. Pope Francis reasoned that God the Father liked it when someone fell asleep in prayer. That falling asleep during prayer can become a way of entrusting oneself to God.

What do the saints tell us? St. Thérèse of Lisieux admitted that she fell asleep in prayer. She said "I don't feel at all distressed. I know that children are just as dear to their parents whether they are asleep or awake." As parents we can relate to that. When they've fallen asleep, our children are completely docile and trusting. We can pick them up and put them in bed without any struggle, knowing that they are in a completely safe and loving environment.

Now, none of this is meant to say that it's okay to fall asleep every time we pray. We must strive to dedicate time in the morning and throughout the day to pray. But what if the next time we lay down with the anxieties of our day, or wake up in the middle of the night and stare at the ceiling...what if instead of turning to secular sleep apps or sleeping pills, we turn instead to God: 'Come to me, all you who are weary, and I will give you rest.' (Mt. 11:28)


