
#### A Note From Our New Parish Administrator:

#### **Striving For Excellence**

I enjoy watching the Olympics, not just for the sports but for the incredible stories of the athletes. It's awe-inspiring to see the level of training and sacrifice they endure just to compete. These athletes represent the best their country has to offer, striving

for a chance at a golden moment against the best in the world.

One of my hobbies is running. When I consider my times, they are nowhere near world-class. In fact, I generally run the same distances in about twice the time as these great athletes. When I think about how slow I am, I wonder why I even do it. I am so slow compared to others, but then I remember how much I enjoy the feeling after I finish a run. I did it again!

Even though I don't have world-class speed, there are other things I can do that these world-class runners might not be able to do. This realization underscores the idea that we are all individuals with unique gifts and talents. The athletes in the Olympics have found their one thing and have worked at it with unceasing devotion. It reminds me of Paul's letter to the Corinthians: "Every athlete exercises discipline in every way. They do it to win a perishable crown, but we an imperishable one" (1 Cor. 9:25).

Our lesson from the Olympics is that we should make every effort to strive for the "imperishable" crown. The Catholic Church recognizes those souls who have made such efforts, not with a gold medal, but by recognizing them as Saints. While it is unlikely that any of us will win a gold medal, it is certain that we are all called to wear the saintly crown.

I had the pleasure of attending the Eucharistic Congress on July 17-21. This is the beginning of a series about the Congress and some thoughts on the Most Holy Eucharist.

A response to the Eucharistic Congress: The Most Holy Eucharist— the opening paragraph in Canon Law

Can. 897 The most August sacrament is the Most Holy Eucharist in which Christ the Lord himself is contained, offered, and received and by which the Church continually lives and grows. The eucharistic sacrifice, the memorial of the death and resurrection of the Lord, in which the sacrifice of the cross is perpetuated through the ages is the summit and source of all worship and Christian life, which signifies and effects the unity of the People of God and brings about the building up of the body of Christ. Indeed, the other sacraments and all the ecclesiastical works of the apostolate are closely connected with the Most Holy Eucharist and ordered to it.

The red wording above describes the Churches that are taking care of the Eucharist above and beyond the daily Mass: adoration and extension to those who are ill. Many times, we see churches that have people there daily adoring Jesus. This Canon tells us we will hold the Most Holy Eucharist in the highest honor, actively celebrating the most "August" sacrifice.

The word August in the Canon Code describes the Eucharist. August means consecrated, venerable. Does this not describe our Most Holy Eucharist? We should be receiving the Sacrament devoutly and frequently, worshiping it with the highest adoration. This word is not often used in English to describe something; we usually see it as the month of August, which we are in. This word comes from the Latin name of the Emperor when Jesus was born, Augustus Caesar. But, we find this word in the canon describing the Most Holy Eucharist.

How can you be in August with the Most Holy Eucharist?


